Getting a Handle on Toilet Repairs

Believe it or not, October is official Toilet Tank Repair month. We thought we'd use the occasion to flush out a few misconceptions about do-it-yourself tank repair. First, it probably won't overflow. Toilet bowls are designed in such a way that they will usually hold the entire contents of the tank without overflowing. That is, if you don't try to flush it a second time. Second, you can turn the water off one of two ways: in back of or in the tank. The shut-off valve is located behind the tank on the wall or you could remove the tank lid and lift up on the float ball or cup. Third, to use a plunger on a backed up toilet, less is more. Too much force can cause a mess.

Don't fall prey to road rage

nyone who does any commuting to and from work knows how it can turn into an exercise in frustration. It can be like a war zone out there. But as tempting as it is to retaliate for rude driving, don't make a bad situation worse. Follow these safety rules:

Don't escalate aggression. That means don't tailgate a driver who tailgated you first or flip the bird to a rude driver. Don't respond to the road bullies.

Don't tap your brakes when someone is tailgating. You may be giving the driver a friendly reminder that he's following too car. A confrontation at a stop-

If you're being followed by a hostile driver, don't go home. Drive instead to a public place like a gas station or restaurant. Better yet, head to a police station if one is nearby. If you have your cellphone call the police and report the driver.

Cat lenses: It's all fun, until you can't see

Nifty cat lenses could look great with your costume this Halloween. But ask yourself one question: Can you afford to lose your vision for eight weeks or so?

That is what happened to one woman, according to the American Academy of Ophthalmology.

The AAO reports that the West Virginia woman wore illegally made, colored lenses for 10 hours. The lens stuck like a suction cup to her eyeball. She required four weeks to recover from the pain associated with the damage to her cornea and infection. She could not see well enough to drive for eight weeks

She now lives with a scar on her cornea, a drooping eyelid and vision damage - a bad trade for one night out.

Because of incidents like this, it is illegal to sell costume contact lenses without a prescription. But some unscrupulous vendors do exist.

No contact lenses are 'one size fits all.' Your eye must be measured and the proper lens prescribed, or you risk infection, vision damage and more.

Mama Chiarello's Stuffed Eggplant

Makes 4 servings Prep Time: 30 minutes Start to Finish: 1 hour 20 minutes

1 large eggplant

3 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil 1/2 teaspoon grey sea salt 1/4 teaspoon black pepper 1/2 pound ground beef

1 onion, diced small (about 1 cup) 1 red bell pepper, diced small (about 1 cup)

3 cloves garlic, finely chopped 1/2 cup chopped fresh parsley

1/2 cup chopped fresh basil leaves 1 1/4 cups grated pecorino

Romano cheese 1/2 cup Progresso plain panko

crispy bread crumbs 1 whole egg

2 chopped tomatoes

Heat oven to 350°<mark>F</mark>.

Cut eggplant in half and scoop out center, leaving enough meat inside the skin so that it holds its shape when baked. Chop eggplant that has been scooped out of the inside; place in saucepan, cover with water and boil until very soft, 10 to 12 minutes.

Meanwhile, in medium sauté pan, heat 1 tablespoon olive oil over medium heat. Salt and pepper the beef. Add seasoned ground beef to pan, and sauté until all of its liquid is evaporated and beef begins to brown slightly. Let cool briefly, and chop cooked beef so that there are no large chunks of meat. In another medium sauté pan over medium heat, add remaining 2 tablespoons olive oil, and sauté the onion, pepper and garlic together in oil.



In bowl, mix together cooked eggplant, vegetables, beef, herbs, 1 cup cheese, 1/4 cup bread crumbs and egg. Fill scooped-out eggplant halves with this mixture, dividing it evenly between the two halves.

Top with chopped tomatoes, remaining 1/4 cup cheese, remaining 1/4 cup bread crumbs, and season with salt and pepper. Place on an oiled oven tray or baking dish, and bake for 50 minutes. Let cool briefly; slice widthwise and serve.

Enjoy with Pinot Noir, Merlot or Cabernet Sauvignon.
