Northgate Residents Ownership Corporation Resident Policies: Dishwasher Installation

Northgate has always strived to conserve water whenever possible. Dishwashers now use less water than washing by hand. The policy below outlines the steps that must be taken if a resident wants to install a dishwasher underneath their countertop.

- 1. Residents MUST complete a home improvement form. This form can be obtained from the management office.
- 2. Residents are responsible for all costs of the purchasing of a 24" dishwasher and all the necessary hoses and attachments.
- 3. Installation MUST be completed by a licensed plumber AND electrician with proper insurance certificates. The name and the address of the plumber and the electrician must be approved on the home improvement form.
- 4. NO WORK IS TO BEGIN until the home improvement form is submitted, the insurance certificates are submitted, and the installation is approved.
- 5. Residents are responsible for removal and safe storage of the cabinet for the dishwasher installation. Any damages to the cabinet or the countertop will be charged back to the resident.
- 6. Residents MUST call the office and schedule the inspection of the completed dishwasher installation to ensure that the work has been completed in a safe and professional manner.
- 7. ANY AND ALL REPAIRS TO THE DISHWASHER ARE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE RESIDENT.
- 8. ANY damage incurred due to the installation or malfunction of the dishwasher will be charged back to the resident. These include but are not limited to the following: damage to the flooring, damage to the countertop, damage to the cabinet, damage to the plumbing, damage to the electrical, damage to Northgate appliances, water damage.

Northgate Residents Ownership Corporation Resident Policies: Water Use for Gardening

Many residents within the Northgate community enjoy gardening. For a good number of these residents, gardens are an important part of their family's access to healthy and organic food. Since gardens must be watered, please use the steps below to enjoy your gardens and conserve water at the same time.

- 1. Residents will furnish their own faucet adapter and hose.
- 2. Residents will ONLY use the kitchen sinks for watering. Northgate does not approve placing the hose through the basement windows.
- 3. Residents will ensure that the hoses are "flat to the bottom of the sink" so there is no water running down the hose onto the kitchen floor.
- 4. Residents MUST use a spray attachment for watering their garden. The spray attachment will provide a soft stream of water for the plants and conserve water.
- 5. It is important to remember to not over-water. This is not good for the plants and it does not conserve water.
- 6. If a resident chooses to collect rainwater to water their gardens, only **authentic rain barrels** are allowed. Using any other type of receptacle poses a hazard to small children and animals and encourages the breeding of mosquitos.
- 7. The hoses will be used for gardens only. The residents will not use the hoses for washing cars (as per the Home Improvement Policy) or washing the sides of buildings, outdoor toys, etc.
 - a. Hoses <u>may be used</u> for filling "kiddie pools" but per the Shared Green Space policy, NO "kiddie pools" (or larger varieties) are allowed in the courtyards or common areas (also known as "green spaces"). Pools MUST be placed in your backyards.
- 8. The hoses will NOT be stored outdoors. Bring the hose inside after each watering.
- 9. The resident is responsible to any damage to the inside or outside of Northgate property due to the use of a hose.

- 1. Occupancy Report: As of July 31, 2019, the number of vacant units was 5. This represents a 1.48% vacancy rate as of July 31, 2019. We received 5 new notice of intent to vacate.
- 2. <u>Collection Report:</u> During the month of **July** we sent **17** eviction notices for unpaid rent. Of those, **15** paid in full or entered into a re-payment agreements. **2** have been submitted to the attorney.
- 3. Legal Report: We currently have 2 open legal cases.
- 4. <u>Pets/Assistance Animals:</u> We continue to update all pet/assistance animal vaccination verifications and city dog licenses.
- 5. <u>Waiting list status:</u> The following is the breakdown of our waiting list by bedroom size and income tier:

Work areas

Resident and Community Engagement

Action and Progress/Work in Progress

- From July of 2016 to June of 2019 resident engagement is now at 188 households, engaging with 291 individuals not previously engaged with before...this represents 56% of households for the full site, still averaging 9 residents per month.
- 72 households have signed up for online payments; this represents 21.42% of the total site.

Governance

- I staffed the annual gathering (meeting) on Saturday June 1. Thank you to the board members that attended. Our guests from Senator Leahy's office, Senator Sanders office and Congressman Welch's off ice were very well received and read statements from each senator/congressman. Franklin Paulino, city councilman for the Northern District in Burlington also attended and said a few words.
- I staffed the resident van meeting on June 3, to receive feedback about the van trips for each month. There are now 9 van trips, all on Tuesdays and Thursdays. We have two van drivers, although one will be recovering from surgery in September and October, so all van trips in September and October will be handled by one volunteer and the trips will all be 12-4 (currently one driver have 10-2 hours and the other 12-4).
- I had the opportunity, along with resident director Linda Romeo, to be interviewed during the CCTV VAHC public access television program. The program highlighted Northgate, its history. the evolution of how we got where we are now and the need for affordable housing.

Timeline

- The physical Timeline was delivered to have high quality pictures made of the panels so we can make posters and have them mounted on foam-board to make easy travel. (it has since been picked up and I have the photos saved on my computer).
- As of the writing of this report, I've submitted a work order to have the timeline mounted in the community hall and to have plexiglass installed over it to preserve the artwork.

Resident Engagement

• I staffed the 6th Annual fishing Derby on June 22. We had 14 Northgate and they all had a very good time. Our first-place winner was a girl, the second-place winner was a girl and third-place winner was a boy. This year, I brought coffee and bagels for the parents who give up the very early portion of their Saturday for their kids. This was

very much appreciated. We had 5 volunteers: Mike and Monica Elwood, Brian Walker, Linda Romeo and Kevin Bean.

- A group of Seniors have been going to the Heineberg Senior Center for lunch every Wednesday. The cost is \$5 per person. NROC scholarships the cost if anyone needs the help. Thus far we've had up to 7 seniors attend.
 - o I have also been working with Marilyn Hake of SASH at the Heineberg Center to get our seniors or those who qualify here at Northgate on SASH services. Thus far it has been a very positive and productive relationship.
- A group of residents have been going to the free Williston concerts each Thursday night. Thus far it is mainly seniors, but all are welcome (although there are limited seats on the van). Each person is responsible for their own dinner and drinks. It's a great way for me to be able to get to know our residents better. Some folks drive themselves; others take the Northgate van. Our highest number thus far has been 9.
