Remove window air conditioners at the end of summer



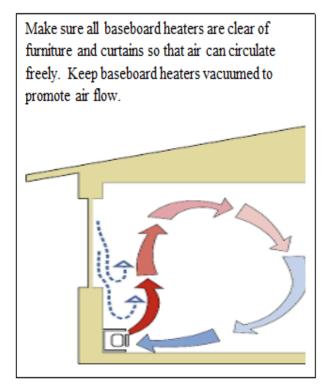
Keep windows closed in the winter. Keep the outside air from coming inside. If the apartment is too hot, please contact Management.

LANDLORD CERTIFICATION FOR 2016 TAX RETURNS

The Landlord Certifications will be mailed **no later than January 31, 2017**. Calculation and completing the 336+ landlord certification forms is a very time consuming process. Please be sure to put this in a safe place until you are ready to file your tax return. The Vermont Tax Department requires that this be the ORIGINAL FORM, not a copy.

LOCKS ON DOORS

A reminder to all residents: **locks on the outside of basement, bedroom and closet doors** are not allowed at Northgate. While we understand that residents occasionally install them for safety purposes, locks installed in these areas are a violation of state, local and federal housing regulations. Please **do not install locks on the exterior** of any doors.

SNOW REMOVAL

It's that time again! We are getting snow...we have included a copy of the Northgate Snow Removal policy as a reminder to everyone how the snow removal process works. Please remember if you are going to be away, **you will need to make arrangements** to either park your vehicles off site or have it moved in the event of a snow storm. **Any vehicles not moved for snow removal will be towed at the owner's expense.**

BASEMENT WINDOWS

As cold weather arrives, please be certain that all basement windows are <u>securely closed</u>. Leaving these windows open may cause pipes to freeze and burst.

AUTO CALLS

The management office is using an automatic calling system to inform residents of upcoming events, snow removal and other important messages. Please be sure to listen to your messages when you receive an auto call.

NROC Policy Spotlight

Northgate Residents Ownership Corporation Resident Policies: Snow Removal*

Staff will begin plowing roads, main walks, and a path down the center of each parking lot when approximately two (2) inches of snow has accumulated. Main walks consist of the roadside, walkways, and sidewalks around each parking lot. Sand/salt mix will be applied as needed.

Sidewalks and Walkways

Between 6:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m., or as deemed necessary, staff will start to clear the doorways and sidewalks leading to the cars of residents who are on Management's disabled/elderly list. Staff will also clear around all mailboxes and fire hydrants.

Clearing of all other walkways will begin after all main walks, paths down the centers of parking lots, and doorways/sidewalks serving residents on Management's disabled/elderly list have been cleared

and as time allows. "Other walkways" includes those in courtyards and common areas.

Parking Lots

Blinking yellow lights are in various locations on site. These lights are turned on in the early morning when staff are ready to begin plowing individual parking spaces, after the main roads have been cleared. Vehicles must be removed from the parking lots by 8:00 a.m. when lights are blinking, or they will be towed at the owner's expense. Parking lots are cleared on a "first emptied" basis.

Vehicles should be moved back into parking spaces as soon as parking lots have been plowed and the sidewalks have been cleared. Residents will be informed parking lots and surrounding sidewalks have been cleared by the yellow light being turned off or by a call from Management.

Snow banks at the end of parking lots will be moved to other locations on site as soon as possible, with priority given to snow banks that block a driver's vision and ability to safely access any roadway.

During snowfalls, it is prohibited to park a vehicle:

- In areas marked with orange traffic cones; these areas are "no parking" zones during snow storms.
- On the roadway overnight, as it interferes with plowing.
- With front or rear bumpers extending over the sidewalk because it prevents staff from clearing walkways completely.
- Directly opposite to parking lot entrances because it hinders plow trucks.

Vehicles parked in violation of the above are subject to towing at the owner's expense.

Resident Services

Residents in need of snow removal assistance can be added to the disabled/elderly list upon request and approval by Management. Blue barrels with sand/salt mix are placed at six locations on site for residents' use.

JANUARY RECIPES

Braised Beef with Mushrooms

Ingredients

2 tablesppons of olive oil

1 tablespoon butter

4 cups finely diced onion

2 large cloves of garlic, peeled and crushed

2 tablespoons tomato paste

2 tablespoons paprika

I teaspoon dried majoram

4 pouns beef chuck roast, trimmed and cubed1 teaspoon salt, divided2 pounds fresh mushrooms (or

1 cup beef broth

2-3 teaspoons tarragon as garnish

4-5 small cans)

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees
- 2. Heat oil and butter in large heavy pot over medium heat (you'll need a pot that you can transfer to the oven). Add onions and garlic, stirring until the onions are soft and beginning to brown; about 8-10 minutes. Stir in tomato paste, paprika and majoram.
- 3. Season beef with salt and pepper. Add beef and mushrooms to the pot stirring gently to combine. Add broth and cover with a tight-fitting lid.
- 4. Transfer the pot to the oven and bake until the beef is tender; 1.75 to 2.5 hours. Stir.
- 5. Skim or blot any visible fat from the stew. Trasfer the beef and mushrooms to a bowl with a slotted spoon. Return the pot to the stove and bring the mixture to a gentle simmer. Cook until sause just coats a spoon. Stir in the bef and mushrooms and the remaining ½ teaspoon of salt and heat through for about 1 minute. Serve garnished with tarragon if you wish.
- 6. Serve with egg noodles if desired.

You can make this ahead of time! Prepare through Step 4, cool and cover. Refrigerate for up to 3 days for freeze. Finish with Step 5 before serving.

Homemade "Aussie Bites"

You may have seen these in the store...they are little bites packed with nutrition and this recipe is **gluten free!** Makes 26 servings

Ingredients

1/4 cup maple syrup (you may use 1 cup of maple syrup and omit the agave)

¼ cup agave syrup (you may use 1 cup of agave syrup and omit the maple)

- 1.5 cups gluten free whole grain oat flour
- 1.5 cups hazelnut flour
- .5 cups hulled sunflower seeds
- 7 tablespoons flaxseed meal
- .5 cups dried cranberries
- 9 dried apricot halves, diced small
- 8 tablespoons organic virgin coconut oil
- 8 tablespoons unsweetened shredded coconut

Instructions

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Grease a mini (24 count) muffin tin. Place dry ingredients in a food processor* and pulse until mixed. Heat the coconut oil and syrups in a pan until mixed. Cut the apricots into quarters and add along with cranberries to the dry ingredients. Pulse until mixed. Add the heated oil and syrups to the dry mixture and pulse until the dough is mixed. Pack into the greased muffin tin. Back for 12 minutes and cool for 10 minutes. (the cooler the muffins the less chance they will crumble). Remove by lifting each muffin gently with a butter knife. Store in a closed container.

* (if you don't have a food processor, make sure the dried fruit is cut very small and the mixture is well mixed into a dense dough)

Each muffin is 158 calories; 11 g fat; 5 g saturated fat; 14 g carbohydrate; 3 grams fiber; 7 grams sugar; 3 grams protein; 3 mg sodium; potassium 61 mg; iron 5%; vitamin A 1%; calcium 1%.

NROC Boardroom

October 2017

The Budget Committee presented the proposed 2017 budget to the Board of Directors. Each line item in the budget was discussed. Some costs are up, some are down. For example, due to LED lights being installed by the Northgate Maintenance team around the site, Northgate's electric bill has realized substantial savings. The Board of Directors **approved Northgate's \$4,268,964.00 proposed operating budget**.

The Board of Directors also approved an amendment to the NROC Board Per Diem policy for conference expenses.

Security: The Budget Committee asked that the Residents Advisory Committee create a security proposal. That report will be forthcoming. The meeting adjourned at 7:55.

November 2017

The NROC Board of Directors discussed 3 updated or new Board policies:

NROC Childcare Payment Policy (for when a resident attends a Board of Directors or Committee meeting; childcare payments, paid directly to the childcare provider, are available; rates are based on national childcare rates).

NROC Confidentiality Policy and Agreement (confidentiality guidelines and agreement for board meetings).

NROC consultant Hiring Policy (when the board of directors has need of hiring a consultant for certain projects).

The meeting was adjourned at 7:15. The Board of Directors meet the fourth Tuesday of every month; supper is served at 5:30 and the meeting starts at 6:00. All residents are most welcome!

On average, a person uses 50 gallons of water each day. By becoming conscious of how water is wasted, you can reduce your usage. Conserving water saves money and helps protect our most precious resource.

A lack of water, even though it may not seem to be apparent here in Vermont, has begun to become a major concern in many parts of our country.

While Vermont may not be experiencing some of the water shortage problems that exist elsewhere, the delivering of clean water to one's home is not an inexpensive proposition and Northgate is no exception to that rule. **Northgate as a community pays nearly \$200,000.00 on average, each year, for water services.** While Northgate residents do not pay a monthly water bill directly, the cost of water is a part of Northgate's annual operating budget. Wasting water is nothing more than wasting dollars that can be better used toward improving our community. Please remember that savings do not go into the pocket of a property owner here at Northgate, but instead are used to better the community as a whole.

The following is a list of water saving tips that not only can help to keep Northgate's bills lower, but also help our environment:

- Take **short showers** instead of baths. A full bath requires approximately 36 gallons of water. A five minute shower using a low-flow restrictor will use only 15-25 gallons.
- Don't leave the water running while brushing your teeth and/or shaving. Put a stopper in the sink and dunk the razor instead of rinsing it under the faucet. Saves 4 -10 gallons per day.
- **Don't use the toilet as a trashcan**. Don't flush items like facial tissues or paper towels. Saves 2 gallons per flush.
- Wait until you have a full load before washing clothes. Washing machines use 22-25 gallons per load.
- Use the water level appropriate for the load; consider washing with cold water.
- Store drinking water in the refrigerator rather than allowing the tap to run in order to get a cold drink of water.
- Use the correct amount of water for cooking.
- Reuse water from boiling or steaming pasta and vegetables to water plants once it cools.
- Rinse fruits and vegetables in a bowl of water instead of under the faucet. Saves 2-4 gallons per day.
- When washing your hands don't let the water run while you are lathering.
- **Do not use running water to defrost meats of frozen foods**. Let the item thaw in the refrigerator or use the defrost setting on your microwave oven.
- Report all plumbing leaks or running toilets immediately. A running toilet left unrepaired can add hundreds of extra dollars to a monthly water bill. A faucet dripping at a rate of one drop per second can waste 2,700 gallons of water per year.
- When purchasing a new clothes washer consider an ENERGY STAR certified washer. These washers use 20% less energy and 35% less water, or only 15 gallons of water per load as opposed to the 23 gallon average used by a standard washing machine. ENERGY STAR certified appliances may also earn you a rebate from your local power utility.

Please remember that the washing of vehicles is strictly prohibited at Northgate.
